

<u>Gospel</u>

John 2:1-11

¹ On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. ² Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. ³ When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." ⁴ And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." ⁵ His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." ⁶ Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. ⁷ Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. ⁸ He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. ⁹ When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom ¹⁰ and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and

then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." ¹¹ Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

Repeat after the leader: That's the story of God and God's people. God, thanks for your story.

<u>Dismissal</u>

Children are welcome to stay or are invited downstairs to continue reflecting on this story.

1 Corinthians 12:1-11


¹Now concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed. ²You know that when you were pagans, you were enticed and led astray to idols that could not speak. ³Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says "Let Jesus be cursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit.

⁴ Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; ⁵ and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; ⁶ and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. ⁷ To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. ⁸ To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, ⁹ to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, ¹⁰ to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the interpretation of tongues. ¹¹ All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

Reconnect with Baptism

Baptism is the ritual recognizing God's Great Love for us, a love that we do nothing to earn or deserve, a love freely and abundantly given. Baptism acknowledges the God of Life, of Living Water, is already at work in all of us and in the world, and this is what we recognize and celebrate.

Nobody, no denomination, owns baptism; some of you were baptized in a Lutheran Church and some in other churches. God was present at your baptism and God is present today as we remember your baptism.

Each new member is invited to touch the baptismal water.

Reception of New Members (Council Member)

We are a part of a tradition that is both ancient and alive today. Our language of membership honors this dynamic. Let us confess our faith together with the words of the Apostles' Creed:

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints,

the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

(Pastor Julie, to those entering into membership)

In baptism, we are welcomed into the body of Christ and sent to share in the mission of God. We are called to live among God's faithful people, to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth.

Members of the household of God, I commend these persons to your love and care. Do all in your power to increase their faith, confirm their hope, and perfect them in love.

All: We give thanks for all that God has already given you and we welcome you in Christian love. As members together with you in the body of Christ and in this congregation of The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, we renew our covenant faithfully to participate in the ministries of the church by our prayers, our presence, our gifts, and our service, that in everything God may be glorified through Jesus Christ. Amen.

New Members may return to their seats. The service continues with the Prayers.



Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil.


For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours,

Everyone is welcome to participate in communion. Today Hope offers bread, white grape juice (colored cup) and white wine (white cup) for dipping, pre-filled juice cups with wafers, and pre-filled juice cups with a gluten-free wafer. You may choose to receive bread only and/or one of the cup options. Any version of communion carries the full power of communion. If you prefer not to receive elements, you may cross your arms over your chest for a no-contact, verbal blessing. You are invited forward to stand or kneel at the railing; after those who wish to come forward receive, servers will bring communion to those who prefer to stay in your seats.

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Today Hope welcomes new members. Read a bit about these people, formally joining our church:

Anne and James G: Anne grew up in Central Pennsylvania and James in the Rochester, New York area. The snow this winter has made us feel right at home! We met while working at the Lutheran summer camp of the Upper Susquehanna Synod in PA called Camp Mount Luther, and got married there about two and a half years ago. After getting married we lived in State College, PA while James pursued a Master's degree at Penn State, and now starting his Doctorate degree in Wind Band Conducting at the University of Maryland is what has led us here to College Park. While here Anne is teaching high school biology, forensic science, and marine biology in the Anne Arundel County Schools. When we are not teaching, we can often be found on a walk with our film cameras or playing board games and card games. We are so glad we found a Lutheran church that feels like home.

<u>Mike, Tami, Cru and Kai L</u>: We are the Lee family and are happy to have found such a family friendly church right in our own city of College Park. Tami works at the UMD in fitness & wellness and Mike works in finance. Cru is a Kindergartener, Kai is a preschooler and they love all things sports, movement, and outdoors.

Rev. Nyamugusha L: Born and raised in the East of the Democratic Republic of Congo/ Kinshasa, lived in South Africa/ Johannesburg about decade and a half. I now reside in Maryland, USA. I hold a degree in social development, which I have had the chance to utilize while working with several NGO. The heart to reach out and bless lives has translated to ministry. As I am in the USA, I continue to serve God and serve my community.

Michelle M: I was born and grew up in Madison, Wisconsin and have ancestors from Norway and Germany who came to America at the turn of the 20th Century. I was baptized at Calvary Lutheran Chapel in Madison, which is a Missouri Synod church. I was later confirmed at age 14, but my family left that denomination during my senior year of high school. I became deeply active with the ELCA when I was working as a librarian at Lenoir-Rhyne University, an ELCA school in North

Carolina. I was drawn to the ELCA because of its emphasis on social justice, racial reconciliation and inclusiveness for women. I moved to Maryland about a year ago, bought a home and came to Hope in part because it is a Reconciling in Christ congregation and I am a member of the LGBTQ community. I feel at home at Hope and like I can be myself here. I continue to work as a librarian, have a cat I adore and am a classically trained musician. I enjoy reading, listening to music and spending time catching up with friends over coffee.

Jennifer N: I am originally from Sharon Center, Ohio—west of Akron, south of Cleveland. I attended the University of Akron and am still a supporter of their Women's basketball team (Go Zips!). I moved to Baltimore 35 or so years ago; fortunately, my sister allowed me to live with her and we remain close. That sister prayed Thom into my living room, where we met on our way to a Pink Floyd concert. In my work career I did IT support for the publishing industry and nonprofits, edited grant proposals and newsletters, did a LOT of purchasing and supported a previous head of NSF with PowerPoint and speech preparation. In retirement I swim, drive friends to doctors, watch women's basketball and read. I think about adulting issues like housekeeping and cooking, but mostly that's as far as I get.

Rev Bob R: After taking 3 degrees and deciding I didn't really want to be a doctor, I took a small congregation in California, spent 8 years in Papua New Guinea as a missionary/seminary professor, and three congregations back in Florida, retiring a bit more than a year ago. I actually miss working! I moved here from Florida to be closer to my youngest son, Jonathan and his family. While I grew up in New York and Connecticut, since 1975 I have been mostly in pretty warm places, and am trying to get used again to the cooler weather here. I am trying to get to know people in the area, and have been delighted by those I have met at Hope.
